

Today's speaker was **District Governor Win Schoneman** who gave us a very impressive talk about the projects he was involved in, surgical team in Romania and a very serious talk about human trafficking especially in Hawaii!

**PP Chuck Braden** shared the Aloha Bucket. **PP/PE Carol Riley** told us that **PP Gene Gelfo** misses us and needs our thoughts and friendship as he continues his recovery from surgery. **PP Dick Matti** welcomed **PP/PE Carol Riley** back to the Club and thanked **PP Bob Tellander** for the good job he has done as Scribe while she was gone. **PP Gayle Warshawsky** thanked **DG Win** for coming to our meeting. **PDG Phil Sammer** welcomed **DG Win** and congratulated **Adrienne King** and others for all they have donated to Polio Plus and the Rotary Foundation. **PDG Laura Steelquest** thanked **Adrienne King** for her donations. **Cindy Bauer** thanked us for letting her lead the pledge today. **Mele Keaoloha-Lindsey** encouraged all members who are missing today to come back to our meetings because we miss them. **Paul McGuillicuddy** gave **PP/PE Carol Riley** a dollar for the bucket and said he was sure Rotarians were going to eradicate polio in the near future and celebrate their success. **PDG Roy King** said **PP Mark Moore** has donated items for our Foodfest auction and has given other items that members may take home if they so choose. **PP Gene Grounds** said he was sorry he missed last week's meeting but he was having fun in Catalina. He said hello to **DG Win**. **PP Tony Gedeon** said he took **PP Mark Moore's** paperweight and he has donated \$100 to Polio Plus.

## ANNOUNCEMENTS

1. The Board has approved that lunches will now cost \$27 until the end of December when our contract with Alohilani Hotel is completed.
2. The Fall Seminar on membership and youth services will be held this Saturday. All are invited to attend. Let **President Steve** know if you want to attend. The Club will pay the fee.
3. We are having a Halloween Party on October 31st. It is a Wednesday, so we may not have a meeting. The party will be held at **PDG Roy King's** and **PP Gloria Kings** house. RSVPs should go to **Patti Look**. We will have a potluck and we should wear costumes. **Patti** will email details to all members.
4. The golf tournament in coordination with Foodfest will be held at Kaneohe Clipper and will cost \$150. **PP Chad Adams** is facilitating this activity.
5. We gave away dictionaries to third graders at Likelike Elementary School today.

6. On October 7<sup>th</sup> we will be hosting an information booth at the State Capitol and we need ten volunteers. There will be between 4000 and 6900 people attending.
7. **Adrienne King** said that the Board decided to give \$1,000 to international projects in Lebanon, Thailand, and Romania. Each of these \$1,000 turns into \$3,500 donations due to matching funds. We are making a difference in our world.
8. **Sylvia Makk** said that she is trying to find a new date for Rotary on the Road and Rotary Readers begins next week. She sent around a sign-up sheet for volunteers
9. **Glenn Perry** said that we had 100% participation in giving to Polio Plus last year and he hopes we have the same participation this year.

**President Steve** asked for **Adrienne King, PDG Laura Steelquest, and PDG Phil Sammer** to come to the front of the room. **PDG Laura Steelquest** said that **PDG Clint Schroeder** really stressed Polio Plus and he gave out silver and gold medals to those who gave \$500 and \$1,000. **Adrienne King** did not get her gold medal, so **PDG Laura** presented the gold medal to her. **Adrienne** said she was humbled and she encouraged everyone to give to Polio Plus and the Rotary Foundation.

**ADG Rhodora Pagay** introduced our speaker **DG Win Schoneman**. **ADG Rhodora** told us that **DG Win** joined the Rotary Club of Honolulu Sunset and was elected President two years later. She said one thing she had hears about **DG Win** is that he not only thinks out of the box...he does not have one!

**DG Win** began by telling us it was glad to be speaking to us. **PDG Roy King** was **District Governor** when he was President. He thanked the Rotary Club of Waikiki, **ADG Rhodora, PP/PE Carol, PDG Phil, PP Janet Scheffer and PP Gloria King** for helping making the Rotary District a success.

On question that **DG Win** gets when he talks to Clubs, is why he wanted to become a district governor. It is a five-year commitment, requires travel, and requires money. He said it was a calling. Then he talked about projects he has been involved in since joining Rotary. He spoke about a literacy project in South Africa and a Vocational Training project in Romania. **DG Win** was trained as an engineer and when he went to Romania he had no idea what he would be doing. He went into a hospital, was given a gown and booties and lead to a room where he saw a little girl with a hole in her mouth. He then saw doctors from the University of Virginia working with the girl. He thought he saw a miracle happening. In addition, the doctors were teaching the doctors in Romania.

He went back to Hawaii and shared his enthusiasm about Rotary with others. He went to a Rotary conference and chose to go to session on human trafficking. He learned so much from the stories he heard. He wondered about human trafficking in Hawaii. He found out that most of the time connections are made on the dark web. An "advertisement" was put on the dark web and there were 407 hits in 24 hours. The majority were from Hawaii! There are things we can do in Rotary. The first thing we can do is have conversations about this and educate others. Forty-two percent of the people involved are women, and the average of those selected is 12.7 years old. This is scary. **DG Win** has a 13 year-old grand-daughter of a single mom.

- **Cindy Bauer** thanked **DG Win** for his presentation. She has done a similar presentation and it seemed to fall on deaf ears. We need to continue talking about this with our communities.
- **Patti Mitchell** said her husband used to work with ICE and this was an area of focus for them. She also feels we need to approach our homeless with as much enthusiasm.
- **DG Win** shared that we need to do a global grant in our own community on this topic. We need to work with an International partner, but this is possible.
- **Kathryn Henski** shared that she has seen trafficking first-hand. She is very interested in helping in this effort. **DG Win** said we can currently help with the Serenity Garden for survivors. There will be work days in October and November.
- **PP Sally Blanchard** talked about the importance of Foundation donations being marked Shared. Then the money comes back to us for future use. **DG Win** said that human trafficking is his passion and we all have our own.
- **PP Bob Tellander** talked about the importance of local participation...not just Rotarians, but community members working together on topics. It is important to integrate the community with Rotarians.
- **DG Win** said that this year's District Convention will be held on May 27-29 the Convention Center and there will be Ted Talks on human trafficking that are open to the community.

**President Steve** thanked **DG Win** for his presentation and gave him a copy of the Four Way Test plaque. He thanked **PP/PE Carol** for being Scribe and thanked those who set up for the meeting.

**PP Dave Hamil's** ticket was selected during the investment portfolio and he won a watch! **DG Win** lead the group in the Four Way Test and the meeting was adjourned.
